The 2016-2017 year at Université de Saint-Boniface (USB) exceeded expectations; research was a top priority and everyone worked together to cultivate and strengthen this vibrant community that strives for excellence in French.

RECRUITMENT

Students First

Consistent with its culture of continuous improvement, USB fine-tuned its activities and services, during the 2016-2017 year, in order to better respond to the needs of students and of society. There was substantial work done to restructure the plan for services based on current and emerging needs, including the implementation of evaluation and prioritization criteria for the various structuring activities. The university and college community were surveyed to create an institutional strategic plan for the student population's mental health. And finally, an accessibility plan was implemented.

Through its highly personalized approach, USB strives to ensure a balance in the recruitment of its student population. Its efforts have paid off, as it is the only postsecondary institution in Manitoba to have shown an increase in enrolment in fall 2016 of approximately 4%. Participation by Francophones and Francophiles from Manitoba and elsewhere in Canada increased by 6%. ►

Living the USB Experience

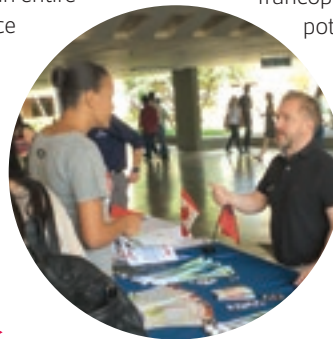
Choosing a university for postsecondary studies is not always an easy decision to make. Thanks to the Student For A Day program offered each year, Grade 11 and 12 students from French and French immersion schools in Manitoba are given the opportunity to live an entire day as a student and to experience student life at USB. They attend two or three courses on site, in which they are treated as regular students by the professors. USB offered this

unique experience to twenty potential students each day for eight days, from February 27 to March 2 and from March 6 to 9, 2017. Nearly 140 applications to participate in the program were submitted, a 38% increase from the previous year. ►



Recruitment Drives

Diversifying international markets in terms of recruitment is very important to USB. The Maghreb, sub-Saharan Africa, East Africa and the United States are fertile grounds for attracting future students, as well as Mexico where, in March 2017, we participated in an exploratory mission organized by the Association des collèges et universités de la francophonie canadienne to determine potential avenues for collaboration between postsecondary institutions in Canada and in Mexico. USB was also present at three student recruitment fairs in Paris, France, two of which were in October 2016 and another in January 2017. ►



Recruitment in Numbers

- **30 tours** of USB given to nearly **600 students** from French and French immersion schools in Manitoba, as well as students from Quebec, New Brunswick, the United States, France and Africa.
- **22 presentations** to nearly **450 Manitoba students** and 5 presentations in Vancouver, Victoria and Northwestern Ontario, reaching approximately **400 more students**.
- **4 evening** information sessions for parents of Grade 11 and 12 students and a presentation in a French school in Timmins, Ontario.
- Participation in **12 career fairs** in Manitoba, Yukon, Quebec and Ontario, where **16,000 people** passed by the USB booth.

RESEARCH

Understanding the Challenges Related to Refugee Immigration

A multidisciplinary team of six researchers, made up of five USB professors and a political scientist from Concordia University, were awarded a grant for approximately \$32,000 from Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada for their research project entitled *Établissement et intégration de réfugiés d'expression française dans une communauté de langue officielle en situation minoritaire francophone : le cas de Winnipeg et Saint-Boniface* (Settlement and integration of French-speaking refugees in an official language minority situation: the case of Winnipeg and St. Boniface).



The team made up of professors Faiçal Zellama, Patrick Noël, Moses Nyongwa, Mamadou Ka, Halimatou Ba and Chedly Belkhodja, with the support of students, will work over a one-year period, to better understand the challenges observed by

establishing and integrating French-speaking refugees in Winnipeg, and to identify the resources made available to them.

In February 2017, Faiçal Zellama and a second team of professors including Patrick Noël and Anne Sechin travelled to Emerson, Manitoba, to gain a better understanding of the recent events at the Canada-United States border regarding asylum seekers. A third of the migrants who crossed the border and presented themselves at the checkpoint to lodge their request for asylum are Francophones from African countries. With the hope of having these potential Francophone newcomers stay to boost the local economy, the Conseil de développement économique des municipalités bilingues du Manitoba decided to support the work by this team of researchers and offered them a grant of \$5,000, co-financed by USB's Research Office. ▶

Work, Policy and Disability

Maria Fernanda Arentsen has been interested in the topic of disability for many years. In January 2017, she was awarded a \$10,000 grant from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council for a project entitled *Travail, politique et handicap : analyse comparative des politiques en soutien à la transition et à l'intégration au travail des personnes ayant des incapacités au Québec et au Manitoba* (Work, Policy and Disability: a comparative analysis of the policies supporting the transition and integration into the workplace of people with disabilities in Quebec and Manitoba). In Manitoba, the problem is even more serious for young Francophones with a disability, as they are in a double minority situation. This important work will make it possible to identify young people's challenges and needs, and to share this information with the government.

To accomplish this, Maria Fernanda Arentsen and her team of researchers are working together with the Center for Interdisciplinary Research in Rehabilitation and Social Integration, in particular with sociologist and political scientist Normand Boucher from Laval University.

In conjunction with this research, the Journée franco-manitobaine de réflexion sur le handicap took place on April 28, 2017. ▶

Cajun Speaker Zachary Richard

A special guest visited USB in March 2017. With a full house, artist Zachary Richard hosted the fourth Robert-Painchaud conference: *L'histoire des Acadiens en Louisiane* (The History of Acadians in Louisiana), which took place as part of the activities of the Canada Research Chair on Migrations, Transfers and Francophone Communities. With humour and personal anecdotes, this singer-songwriter gave the conference a friendly and relaxed atmosphere as he discussed all of the aspects of Louisiana's Francophone history: from colonization to slavery, including war, racial issues, the evolution of the language and the region's different geopolitical realities. ▶

AN IDEAL ENVIRONMENT

Health and Safety at USB

The 2016-2017 year greatly emphasized the importance of health and safety for USB's staff and students. A health and safety committee was formed and the idea of having a week focussed on these topics was launched!

Every day, from April 18 to 22, 2016, two or three organizations related to these fields of expertise had the opportunity to educate the university community on the importance of a healthy lifestyle at work.



The initiative took place again from March 27 to 31, 2017. During this time, the new safety and emergency management plan was launched, which notably includes a fire evacuation procedure. A bilingual guide is now available in every room, which includes cards with assembly points as well as the roles assigned to each individual responsible for a task in the event of an emergency. The website ustboniface.ca/urgences was also created to inform the university community of the various procedures that have been put into place. ▶

The CED Launches CLIC Program!

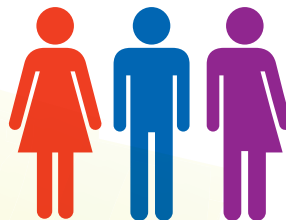
During the 2016 fall session, USB's Continuing Education Division (CED) launched the CLIC program – a course for immigrants to Canada – as part of the free French courses offered to permanent residents through support from Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada. The course is based on the Canadian Language Benchmarks (1 to 4) and it is intended to support immigrants settling in Canada. Through this program, the CED had approximately twenty participants per session for 3 sessions that included 150 hours of training over ten weeks. A committed team of seven staff members are working to ensure that this program continues to succeed. ▶

Celebrating a Quarter of a Century!

The École technique et professionnelle's Early Childhood Education (ECE) program celebrated 25 years since the graduation of its first cohort of students. Approximately one hundred people, including alumni and individuals who have supported the program since its creation in 1989, gathered together at USB on May 14, 2016, to celebrate this important milestone. The ECE program has evolved exceptionally to adapt to the needs of the community, namely by creating the advanced diploma in early childhood education, online courses for family daycare providers, and the accelerated program. This was also an opportunity to announce a few new developments in the program, such as a new online resource: *Introduction au développement de l'enfant* of the non-profit Science of Early Childhood Development initiative. ▶

Translation Games

The 12th Translation Games took place at Concordia University, in Quebec, from March 10 to 12, 2017, and a team of six USB students were there to compete for a spot among the 12 participating teams. Cynthia Brais, Maude Gamache-Bastille, Graeme Olson, Nisha Ouelette, Rokhaya Smith and Katelyn Sutton represented USB for the first time at this competition. Four of these students are studying via distance-ed, so to prepare for the Games, they regularly met through forums or Skype to practise. Maude Gamache-Bastille received 4th place for individual translation toward French, just behind her teammate Cynthia Brais, in 3rd place. Graeme Olson gave his team 5th place for individual translation toward English. The USB team also tied for 1st place in translation with constraints toward English, and 2nd place for advertisement adaptation toward English, as well as for professional simulation (translation toward English). ▶



Supporting Social Equity

USB created a new fund to support the Gay-Straight Alliance—great news for the future of this USB Student Association (AEUSB) club, which was created four years ago. The Gay-Straight Alliance is a positive space that encourages discussion on the needs of the LGBTQ community and of all of the students. The club programming depended fully on AEUSB grants. Going forward, the club will be able to benefit from the interest generated by these grants to provide financial stability for its projects. ▶



Dialogues with the President

As part of the Alumni Association programing, USB President, Gabor Csepregi, created the *Dialogues* series in spring 2016, which allows everyone to discuss a relevant topic with him in the company of a special guest. On April 7, 2016, the President hosted Faculty of Arts professor Paul Morris to discuss the role of universities in society. The second meeting, on October 20, 2016, allowed Glenn D. Joyal, Chief Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench, to share his interesting view on the justice system. On March 2, 2017, Faculty of Sciences professor Anne-Marie Bernier discussed her double passion: molecular biology and genetics, and the art of photography. The final meeting of the series took place on April 27, 2017, with retired senator Maria Chaput, who came to discuss bilingualism in Canada, but also shared interesting details about her life and her time in the Senate of Canada. ▶

Gaining Experience

On October 15, 2016, USB's School of Business Administration and the Chambre de commerce francophone de Saint-Boniface (CCFSB) signed a partnership agreement allowing students to volunteer at CCFSB for a year, providing them with rich learning opportunities. In addition to gaining professional experience, students learn more about how for-profit and not-for-profit organizations work and witness the workings of the Chambre, while benefiting from great networking opportunities with members. This opportunity was open to the entire student population, regardless of their specialty or field of study. Following a brief interview during which candidates were able to put forth their potential contributions, CCFSB selected three students: Nadine Zougmoré, Pascaline Laura Fanté Tefang and Inès Othmani. ▶

Diversity and Inclusion

From February 18 to 25, 2017, Canadian and French youth participated in the 2nd edition of the Human Rights School – a partnership between USB, University of Caen (France), the International Institute for Human Rights and the Canadian Museum for Human Rights. In honour of the 150th anniversary of Canadian confederation, this year's theme was diversity and inclusion. Participants had a detailed schedule, consisting of educational activities, workshops and cultural outings, namely to discover Franco-Manitoban culture during the Festival du Voyageur. ▶

USB's Continuing Education Division (CED) gives children an opportunity to have fun and learn French at *Camplus sur campus!* The spring camp allows children from Kindergarten to Grade 6 to register for one or more themed days organized over spring break. The summer camps last one week, for 6- to 11-year-olds and 12- to-14 year-olds, and have various themes, topics and interests, which vary each summer. In 2016, there was a new addition to the programming with the week *Je vois la vie en Rouges*, led by athletes from the USB sports team, Les Rouges. This week of sports for 12- to 14-year-olds provided intense training in volleyball, basketball and soccer. *Camplus* also explores the visual arts, music, theatre, the environment and science. ▶



On the Road to Excellence in Business

USB's awards luncheon, which took place on March 10, was an opportunity to recognize the efforts of students in the School of Business Administration.

Thanks to the generosity of USB alumnus and long-time donor, Marcel André Desautels, 29 students received an academic excellence scholarship named after this successful businessman. The recipients also took the opportunity to meet the great philanthropist and to receive his valuable advice. ▶



Generous Donors and Bright Students

USB's academic excellence scholarships were awarded during a special soirée on November 17, 2016, to reward the success of its brightest students. In a festive atmosphere, in which appetizers and sweets, a photo booth and guided campus tours were on the menu, 24 merit-based awards and academic excellence scholarships were awarded to students having completed their 1st year with an average GPA of 3.5 or higher. Other scholarships were awarded according to specific criteria, in areas such as culture, health, education or athletic merit. Lastly, high school students with an average of 80-90% received admission scholarships. USB proudly awarded nearly half a million dollars (\$498,619), with a total of 552 awards and scholarships provided during the year, namely \$354,061 at the university level and \$144,558 to École technique et professionnelle. ▶

An evening of fun and good company took place at USB on February 22 as part of the Festival du Voyageur events. The west gymnasium was buzzing with cheer during the *Veillée dans l'Ouest*, an event that provided its 200 attendees with a traditional meal, games, entertainment by the official voyageur family and musical performances to get people dancing! ▶

Impressive Start to the 2016 Session

The start of the 2016 session was very successful, with increased enrolment from the previous year. An exciting time of the year, there was a variety of activities offered during the first week of the session, including a breakfast hosted by management, guided campus tours, information booths on services provided, musical lunch hours, and evenings with themes such as board games, music, glow in the dark dodge ball with DJ music, and a poker tournament. A Record Graduation Rate!

During the 137th university convocation ceremony, which took place on June 6, 2016, USB awarded 187 diplomas – the highest number in ten years. The event was also an opportunity to highlight the work of 17 award and medal recipients, as well as the first two graduates from the Bachelor of Science (double major) cooperative program.

Lise Gaboury-Diallo was awarded the Research Excellence Award, which recognizes faculty members who have distinguished themselves by the breadth and quality of their research work.

École technique et professionnelle’s 2016 convocation will leave a lasting impression. In addition to marking the 40th graduation ceremony, this convocation passed the threshold of 2,000 graduates since the school’s creation in 1975. A total of 123 graduates, six awards and nine medals were presented on June 15, 2016, as well as an honorary diploma awarded to Mariette Mulaire, President and CEO of the World Trade Centre Winnipeg. This Franco-Manitoban businesswoman is the fifth person to receive this honour. ▶

The previous day, the Louisiana artist was in St. Boniface to give a lecture on the history of Acadians in Louisiana. 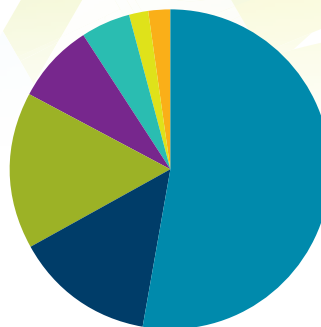
